Introduction

Returning to education after a break can be an exciting but daunting prospect. Going to university is life-changing, and at the University of Wolverhampton we aim to provide a first-class experience for all our students, whatever their age and background.

The University of Wolverhampton welcomes thousands of mature students each year onto a wide range of undergraduate and postgraduate courses, and we would like to encourage you to find out more about the opportunities with us.

Over 40% of students studying at the University of Wolverhampton are classed as mature. We recognise that people have different circumstances, qualifications and requirements when they join us, and this is reflected in the range of services and support we offer. Flexible study

Courses that fit your lifestyle

The University of Wolverhampton is a warm and welcoming place that nurtures talent and creates opportunities, helping students from diverse backgrounds to fulfil their potential within a caring and supportive community.

You might be surprised at how conveniently you can fit your studies into your week. Most full-time courses involve around 12 – 16 hours each week in class (although those with compulsory placements will demand more of your time). Courses with full-time placements include teaching, social work, nursing and the allied health professions.

You can arrange the study you will need to do outside the class around your own weekly commitments – a lot of our library resources are available online. Many of our courses have part-time, as well as full-time, options to suit busy lifestyles so you can choose the best option for you. Full-time degrees normally take three years to complete whereas part-time they can take five to six years.



Studying part-time

We understand how important it is to allow you to study the way you want to, which is why we offer a range of part-time courses and professional development opportunities.

With part-time study you can:

- fit your studies around your work and home commitments
- enhance your employment prospects
- continue earning while you are learning

Part-time study is a flexible and cost-effective way to realise your potential. It provides an opportunity to do a degree course that works with your lifestyle. You can build upon existing skills, head in a new direction, or just pursue your interests and passions!

Please note that most courses with professional work placements can only be studied full-time. The information on the course page will specify whether part-time mode is offered.



Distance learning

Many courses offer blended learning with a mixture of work done at home and on campus. In addition, there are some courses that are offered on a purely distance learning basis which is ideal if your circumstances make attending university difficult. Entry requirements

There are various ways you can show us that you have the right experience and qualifications to join a University of Wolverhampton course. In our experience, many adults tend to be very modest about their achievements and overlook important work and life experiences which demonstrate their skills and capabilities.

We can discuss what the right path is for you and cover everything you need to know (including financial matters) so that you can make the right choice for you. The specific entry requirements for each department or course are listed on the website. Use our course finder to find out more at: wlv.ac.uk/courses However, for many of our courses, mature applicants are not required to have the same academic qualifications as school leavers.

We may consider:

- Relevant skills that have been developed during paid or voluntary work
- Professional qualifications undertaken at work
- Access to HE Diploma and other relevant level 3 qualifications
- A Foundation Year studied prior to starting the degree (for more information see below)
- Writing an essay, providing a portfolio of evidence, or attending an interview showing your skills and knowledge

As part of the application process, you will be asked to provide a satisfactory reference and sometimes complete a DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) check if you will be working with children or vulnerable people.

Foundation years

Many of our degree courses offer a four-year version, including a foundation year, for people who do not meet the entry requirements to go straight onto the degree. There is a Prepare for Foundation Year Day that you need to attend as part of the entry requirements for these courses. If you are not sure whether you will need to do a foundation year, then contact the Gateway Team for a chat.

Maths and English

Some of our courses require applicants to have GCSE Maths and English, or a level 2 equivalent such as Functional Skills. If you do not have these then you may be able to sit the University's equivalency tests. For most courses these can be done online, however for teaching courses they take place on campus. How to make an application

For full-time undergraduate courses, apply through UCAS at: ucas.com/apply

For part-time undergraduate courses and most postgraduate courses, you apply directly to the university by clicking on the 'apply now' button on the relevant course page. Find out more at: wlv.ac.uk/apply

When do I apply?

As a general guide, full-time applications can be made to UCAS between September and June, however some courses may be full if you apply after January.

Applications for part-time and postgraduate study tend to be made later in the academic year so you can still apply if there are places. The course page will have up-to-date information on whether the course has closed or is still taking applications.

Student finance

Student finance can often be seen as a complex process, especially for mature students with dependants. However, alongside tuition fees, there are a wide range of funds available which students may be eligible to apply for, these include:

- Maintenance loan
- Disabled Students Allowance
- Parent Learning Allowance
- Childcare Grant
- NHS Training Grant
- Master's loan
- Dennis Turner (Hardship) Fund
- Scholarships and bursaries

The Dennis Turner Hardship Fund

The Dennis Turner Fund is the University of Wolverhampton's hardship fund – demonstrating the University's commitment to supporting students who find themselves in genuine financial hardship that might impact on their ability to continue on a course. You must be a current, enrolled student* to apply, and you will be asked to provide details of your income and outgoings as part of the application process so that the team can ensure the funds are targeted at those most in need. Accessibility, disability and inclusion

The University is committed to providing an inclusive and supportive environment for all students and learners, including those with a disability or specific learning difficulties.

Depending on your individual needs, you may be eligible for additional support at university. The Accessibility, Disability and Inclusion team are here to provide you with confidential, personalised advice and information about the wide range of support options to which you may be entitled.

If you have a disability – for example, a long-term health condition or mental health condition or a specific learning difficulty like dyslexia – you should [register with the team](#) to discuss your support needs so a reasonable adjustment plan can be created. You should also check if you are eligible for the [Disabled Students' Allowance \(DSA\)](#) and if you are, apply before starting your course.
